This is particularly true of a van parking on the green verge along Hornbeam regularly and some cars parking on the green area outside the cottages on the main road through the village. This is very true of the houses to the bottom of Meadow Drive. Our covenants restrict 'building' in front of the front line of the properties and surely this would include tarmac drives. 1	Pavements are overgrown, if the hedges were cut back the pavements would be a lot wider and more useable
2	Many pavements are becoming unsafe to walk on and several are very slippery as covered with moss.
3	The inadequate street lighting is on the main road late at night making it difficult for dog walkers or people returning from club/pub etc
4	The pavements are too narrow along the main road especially heading towards chedburgh. When pushing a pram, you are so close to the road at points it's scary. I don't take my son out in the village because it's too dangerous to walk anywhere along the main road. I've had some close calls.
5	Also the pavements and pathways in the village are poorly maintained. When vegetation starts growing over the pathways it takes ages for anyone to do anything about it making the situation worse.
